

多事之秋 Brings Growth to our Programs

(duō shì zhī qiū)

多事之秋 (pronounced duō shì zhī qiū) is a Chinese saying which translates to "troublesome or turbulent times"—a perfect summary for 2020 thus far. I am not here to reiterate the news, rather, to show you the difference HCC donors and volunteers have made in 2020 despite 多事之秋 (duō shì zhī qiū.) Without donor and volunteer partners, the work of HCC grinds to a halt and we owe a huge thank you to their commitment.

To meet the needs of international students during the uncertainty of COVID-19, HCC volunteers and staff assembled 214 care packages with groceries and essential items and personally delivered them to students from China, India, and Mongolia.

HCC's Food Truck program was launched in response to grocery store closures due to the Minneapolis riots. 193 students from 7 different

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countries came to one of our Food Truck events and received a full bag of fresh groceries.

HCC's online programming has surged in popularity! Since going virtual, we now have 67 students participating in Conversation Partners and 49 in Friendship Match! While most of these interactions are via video chat, some students

have started to meet their American partners in outdoor settings. It is encouraging to hear students say, "I now have an American friend. My American friend really cares about me."

We have taken full advantage of the beautiful Minnesota summer! Since May, 187 students have attended one of our 18 different hikes in parks across the state.

This summer we connected with over 100 students (in addition to the 85 students who received furniture. 15 students donated furniture before they returned home) through our furniture program. 
Volunteer Spotlight

2019 marked a pinnacle of financial support for the expansive mission of HCC. For six consecutive years our mission has expanded to more students, more programs, more countries, more cities in China, more revenue, more church partners, and more volunteers.

As we have all experienced in different ways, our world is turning upside down. It started with financial contributions dropping at the end of February for HCC. By March all programs and volunteer mobilization and training had to be completely revamped. In the midst of recreating programming and volunteerism, we said goodbye to FIVE amazing board members whose time was up serving and leading HCC. Dear friends and former board chair, Joann Pittman

and Mike Cady, and amazing servants, Tim Richterkessing, Michelle Nordwall, and Kate Woletz now serve the mission in a different role now.

Thanks to an amazing staff and new board members, we completely revamped and relaunched all new programming and volunteer engagement. The vision of transforming the world through hospitality was not only saved, but this summer our metrics of success for engagement with students and volunteers hit a new record high! HCC is currently on track to have programming infrastructure on St. Thomas, Concordia, Macalister, East Bank, and West Bank. We project connecting with students over 7,000 times this school year!

Despite our programic bounce-back

and expansion, our contributions didn't bounce back. As I write this, HCC is short-staffed and unable to afford to be fully staffed. Our current financial shortfall is nearly 30%.

As we are all adjusting to the impact of COVID-19, I'd ask you to consider helping HCC to get back on budget. HCC needs to raise \$100,000 by the end of the year to get back on track. This is crucial to HCC's ability to maintain a presence on three new campuses. This would ensure that we stay on track to extend the love of Christ to more than 1,000 future leaders from China and the rest of the world.
